PSO STUDENT ART SHOW - CREATIVE TALENTS OPENING JANUARY 17, 2026 AT PARKSIDE ART GALLERY

Students from grades 8 to 12 have contributed a variety of pieces for this show. Artworks range from drawings and paintings to scratch art and prints; with a subject matter that shows the diversity of interests of our student population.

Many pieces come from the day-to-day work that happens in an art class, like drawing warmups, art activities, and project assignments. Some pieces have been done independently by dedicated students specifically for this show. These pieces demonstrate their creativity and technical skill, as well as their perseverance and hard work.

This show highlights student talents in a range of mediums and represents much of what we do in a high school art class. These examples of the student projects show their journey of skill building, developing creativity, and building their own personal style. Students practice with new mediums and different techniques before starting a large project piece. Some projects had multiple processes, and others were simply for students to play and express themselves. This student work is a sampling of who they are as artists.

Students have had a fast paced and focused art experience so far this school year. With daily practice students develop their skills quickly and their artistic progression is evident. Through these exercises and projects, they learn to persevere and work through challenging artistic struggles. They adapt, they problem solve, they suffer the frustrations that all artists do, and they grow.

ETHICAL USE OF AI

This week in grade assemblies, we talked to students about the use of AI. After a brief show of hands, it appears that roughly 2/3 of our students have tried using ChatGPT for schoolwork, which is inline with national averages. The crux of the matter is that we want them to learn how to use AI responsibly. We talked to students about the potential assistance AI can offer for schoolwork, but also the potential pitfalls. For example, AI is great for brainstorming or idea generation. However, if a student uses it to generate sections of writing which they then claim as their own (ie./ plagiarism), it is a serious issue. Students were encouraged to have discussions with their teachers if they are confused or would like some guidance. Since the rise in popularity of AI has happened very quickly, the school is adapting so that we can best help prepare students for the future.
